




Projected population Growth 2000 to 2028






Age Distribution Change Projected by 2028






The District is becoming more diverse

- ▲ According to the American Community Survey, Spanishspeaking residents mostly reside in the far western part of the district
- ▲ From 2010 to 2028, white population is projected to decrease from 53% to 24%
- ▲ Hispanic population, regardless of race, is projected to increase from 64% to 71% from 2010 to 2028






Sports and Fitness Local Participation Estimates







Needs Expressed by Residents

- ▲ Accessibility: Parks within walking distance, especially in Indian Hills and Jurupa Hills lack of accessible parks, green spaces, dog parks, and trails
- ▲ Amenities: Multipurpose spaces, splash pads, gym equipment, tennis and basketball courts, soccer fields, skate parks, inclusive areas, and shaded areas
- ▲ Safety: Address encampments for unhoused individuals, security, and maintenance of existing parks
- ▲ Trails: Nature trails, interpretive signs, bike lanes, and hiking trails
- ▲ New Parks: Mission Boulevard between Wallace and Crestmore, and the area between Van Buren/Bain and Jurupa/Limonite



Needs Expressed by Residents

- Existing Parks: Improving existing parks with enhanced lighting and better maintenance to address issues like weed growth and outdated equipment. Better upkeep of current parks before developing new ones.
 - Skyview Park: Request for additional gymnasium to create more indoor areas for basketball and other sports
 - Soccer Fields: Add lights on grass fields
 - Avalon Park: Upgrade and revitalize the park
 - Vernola Park: Add water features, a splash pad, or a swimming pool



Needs Expressed by Residents

- Rubidoux Area: Outdoor amphitheater, community gathering spaces, and a neighborhood park
- ✓ Jurupa Hills/Indian Hills Area: New parks to accommodate events like food trucks, farmers markets, and live music
- Fontana South Park: Use the park as an example of an inclusive park
- ▲ Youth Programs: After-school drop-in programs, teen volunteer initiatives, and spaces designated for young adults
- Mira Loma: Additional public tennis courts





Research Methods



Statistically Valid (Invitation Survey)

Surveys were mailed to a systematic random sample of residential addresses in JARPD, with the option to complete online through password protected website (1 response per household). The survey was also available in Spanish online.

Later, the online survey was made available to *all* JARPD stakeholders.





Effectiveness of Communication

Overall, communication from JARPD is rated as moderately effective, with an average rating of 3 out of 5 from the Invite sample and a slightly more positive rating of 3.4 out of 5 for the Open Link sample.

How effective is the JARPD at reaching you with information on parks and recreation facilities, programs, and services?



Key Findings – Needs Assessment Survey



▲ In general, responses from the Open Link survey are similar to the Invite responses, a positive finding that it indicates a more general consensus across the two samples.



- ▲ Average ratings for overall satisfaction with parks, facilities programs, services and maintenance fall between 3.2 and 3.4 on a scale of 1-5, with 5 being "very satisfied". Parks and facilities received the highest ratings of satisfaction.
- Outdoor recreation and outdoor sports fields and courts are the most frequently used facilities, programs, or services.



▲ To increase the use of JARPD facilities, respondents feel that increased shade at park locations, better condition/maintenance of parks and facilities, improved safety and security, and additional amenities would encourage use of JARPD facilities.



Key Findings – Needs Assessment Survey



▲ JARPD parks, open spaces, trails, and pathways are the most important facilities to both samples. However, trails and pathways rated lower in terms of meeting the needs of the community, as did the athletic courts.



■ The top future priorities include repairing/updating existing parks, playgrounds, picnic areas, etc.; developing new indoor recreation centers; increasing shade structures or tree canopies at parks; and developing new walking/biking trails and connecting existing trails.



▲ Many feel welcome at the JARPD parks and facilities; 56% of Invite respondents rated a 4 or 5, with 5 indicating they feel "very welcome".



Key Findings – Needs Assessment Survey



Only 8% of survey respondents (who own a horse) utilize JARPD equestrian areas and trails on a regular basis



■ Overall, communication from JARPD is rated as moderately effective, with an average rating of 3 out of 5, with 5 being "very effective" for the Invite sample and a slightly more positive rating of 3.4 out of 5 for the Open Link sample. The top two most preferred methods of communication are the activity guide/brochure and email.



Key Findings – Needs Assessment Survey




There is some support for increasing rates to support expanded parks and recreation in the District, with 46% of the Invite sample and 40% of the Open Link sample responding that they are somewhat willing to increase fees. The most supported funding option is to increase the current landscape assessment, followed by increased user fees.




Principals of New Master Plan




System Map




Pedestrian Zones









Walkable Access (10 minutes)

The JARPD District Population is Changing Rapidly

- Population is growing
- Older population is growing, while youth are declining
- District has high income, and lower poverty
- Population is growing more diverse 50% increase since 2010
- 64% residents are of Hispanic background
- Significant % of population reports a disability

Highest Use Activities

- Walking and hiking
- Top sports are basketball, golf, and soccer
- Most important provisions and services offered by the district to residents are parks, trails, and special events



District Satisfaction

District residents are very satisfied – 80% across the board

Need for Additional Park Space

- There are gaps in the level of service provided for parks
- 58% have access to quality parks within a 10-minute walk
- 88% within a one-mile drive
- There is a need for 6.5 acres of quality park space to maintain current 1.9 acres per 1,000 district standard
- To close the gap 415 acres are needed to meet the national median
- 64% of district residents own a dog



The JARPD is marginally meeting district resident's needs for parks, trails, and athletic courts

Highest Needs for Parks, Components, and Amenities

- A focus on safety and security in parks and facilities
- More parks, especially in deficient areas Indian Hills and Mira Loma
- Improved and lighted sports fields
- Better communication
- Additional shade in parks
- Additional fitness equipment indoor and outdoors
- New facilities
- Better maintenance of parks and existing facilities

- Youth Programs
- Senior Programs
- Special events
- Enrichment programs
- Swimming programs

Financial

A majority of residents
